## **Computer Tips:**



#### PC Tip:

Do you know that your *Browser* (this is *Google Chrome, Microsoft Edge, Mozilla Firefox, Apple Safari*, etc...) needs to be updated? Just like the operating system (aka Windows Updates or macOS Software Updates), the *Browser* (this is your gateway to the World Wide Web and what you "launch" to start surfing the web & visiting websites) needs to be updated. If you are running an out of date browser, you could put your system at risk. Your system will be vulnerable to malware aka ransomware, privacy exploits & other attacks (all to scam you out of paying for something that is just plain fake or asking you to send gift cards &/or other fake requests to scare you and hand over access to these fraudulent criminals hiding out looking for unprotected and vulnerable computers to get access to). Many people say, "I didn't do anything, it just suddenly appeared". The only way things appear, is if you click on them; especially if you visit a compromised website or you are served a malicious advertisement (found most often in Social Media platforms). Now, there are many questions you may have and many more explanations that can be explained, but the point right now is:

to update your Chrome Browser: got to "Settings" area - this is usually in the upper right corner of the Browser and may be three dots or three lines (aka hamburger) - they represent a Menu, where once you click on it, you will see a list of items to choose from, click on Settings, then click on "About Chrome" and you will see the updates download or it will say you have the latest update (this is usually done, as all updates are done, automatically; but, sometimes it helps to check to get it done immediately). Edge is the same. Mozilla is: Menu button, Help, and About Firefox. On a Mac you would go to the Apple logo (top left corner of screen), select System Preferences, then System Updates, your computer will check and then let you know. On an older Mac you can also check in the App Store.

This is another component included in a Tune up. If you get your computer regularly tuned up (Monthly, Quarterly, or at the very least every 6 months), this is one of the tasks.

We can't let our guard down just because the Trump Administration and its Big Oil cronies are no longer in the White House. That's why this week, <u>I introduced the COAST Anti-Drilling Act</u> to forever ban offshore drilling for oil and gas in the Atlantic. # TWO: Challenging the CEOs of Largest U.S. Banks

Their answers, frankly, are "not enough," and I'm going to keep holding their feet to the fire until that changes.

I'd be remiss if I didn't also take this opportunity to renew my calls for bold, inclusive, and humane immigration reform, because Ashu never should have been separated from his family in the first place. He did everything right, followed all the rules, and had he been given the Green Card he has qualified for since 2012, he would have been able to return to his family without delay. Our outdated immigration system failed him, and I won't stop fighting until we fix it once and for all.

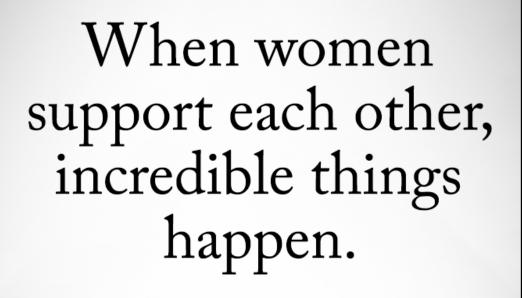
