


# You can help strengthen Title IX by meeting with local school officials!

Today, AAUW is excited to announce a critical update to our <u>Title IX coordinator locator tool</u>. On our website, you can now find every college and university Title IX coordinator organized by state. This update makes it even easier for you to find Title IX coordinators at your nearest K-12 schools, colleges, and universities in just a few clicks.

AAUW advocates have met with over 700 Title IX coordinators at K-12 schools in 29 states. Each of these meetings represents a step forward in our mission to ensure that our schools are free from sex discrimination. We want you to be a part of this one-of-a-kind project!

How can you help?

1. Find your nearest K-12 or higher education Title IX coordinators. Simply select your state, and the coordinator's name, email address, and phone number will appear.



- 2. Schedule a meeting with the Title IX coordinator. Call or email the coordinator and let them know that you want to deliver the Department of Education's Title IX resources on behalf of AAUW. This makes for a great branch project—split up the schools in your area and divide into groups to make the deliveries!
- 3. Deliver the resources. Print the <u>resource guide</u> and the <u>letter to Title IX coordinators</u> to bring to your meeting.
- 4. Don't forget to <u>report how your meeting went!</u> With your help, we can track how many Title IX coordinators our members have contacted by putting your meeting on our delivery map.

Why does this project matter?

The U.S. Department of Education's Office for Civil Rights (OCR) found that some of the most egregious and harmful <u>Title IX violations</u> occur when schools fail to have a Title IX coordinator or when a Title IX coordinator does not have the training or authority to oversee compliance with Title IX. Putting this resource guide in the hands of as many Title IX coordinators as possible can help them better understand and perform their important job of ensuring that schools are free from sex discrimination.

You don't have to be a legislator to strengthen Title IX. Help us <u>fill our map</u> with even more deliveries nationwide. Your local participation in this important project can help ensure that our schools are free from sex discrimination.



# Important Dates in Women's History



# **Special dates:**

On March 3 we remember the 1913 Women's Suffrage March on Washington, DC, where over 8000 women gathered on the eve of President Woodrow Wilson's inauguration to demand a constitutional amendment guaranteeing the right to vote.

March is a month full of firsts for women in government. On the 4th we celebrate the first female member of Congress as <u>Jeannette Rankin</u> (R-MT) takes her seat (1917) and the first female member of the United States Cabinet as <u>Frances</u> <u>Perkins</u> becomes US Secretary of Labor (1933), and on the 11th we celebrate the first female US Attorney General as Janet Reno is confirmed (1993).



On March 8 we observe <u>International Women's Day</u>, the origins of which trace back to protests in the US and Europe to fight for the political rights for working women.

Several birthdays fall in the month of March as well: Olympic track and field athlete Jackie Joyner-Kersee (4th), recordsetting aviator Jerrie Cobb (5th), labor organizer Sue Ko Lee (9th), Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg (15th), Olympic speed skater Bonnie Blair (18th), civil rights activist Dorothy Height (24th), first woman U.S. Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor (26th), first woman Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives Nancy Pelosi (26th), Choctaw Indian teacher and historian Muriel Wright (31st).

# **Congratulations Nancy Rose Foye-Cox**

The National Women's History Project congratulates our Board member, Nancy Foye-Cox, who will receive the Humanitarian Award for Social Action Award on March 10th at the Harold K. Stubbs Award Dinner, hosted by St. Paul African Methodist Episcopal Church in Akron, Ohio.

A graduate of Florida State University, Nancy Foye-Cox retired in 2013 with more than 40 years of extraordinary public service. Her most recent position was as a Victim Advocate with the Summit County, Ohio Prosecutor's Office-Juvenile



Division.

### In Memoriam

We are saddened by the recent passing of two remarkable women who each played an important role in the celebration and making of Women's History.



Our dear friend **Carol Norberg** has passed away at the age of 92. Carol was born in 1924 in Roseville, California, just four short years after women earned the right to vote. Her passion for history started when, as a member of the curriculum committee for her Jewish Community Center, she volunteered to write the section covering the Holocaust.

In the late 1960s, she joined the League of Women Voters, studied early childhood education, and spent much of her time and energy volunteering with the local school district. It was in her role as a substitute teacher that she was able to look

through a wide variety of history textbooks, and noticed the disheartening lack of women.

She served as the chair of Roseville's National Organization for Women (NOW) chapter as well as working with the Roseville Historical Society, where she organized exhibits on local women. In recent years, she and her husband relocated to Oakland, where she was a member of Progressive Oakland Women Empowering Reform, cochairing women Women's Equality Day parades and organizing other events celebrating women's history.

Her passion for history remained, and she used every opportunity to remind young women of the sacrifices others made to get them the right to vote. "Every time women grouse about working in the movement... I think of those women who sloshed though the snow in high-button boots and long skirts. I wish we could somehow put that in some kind of video with virtual reality so young women today could know what women have gone through in the past to secure their rights."

Through a generous inheritance from her older sister, she became a benefactor of the National Women's History Project, and eventually joined our Board of Directors.

Aileen Hernandez was a phenomenal woman whose work as a union organizer and human rights activist has left a lasting impression on the lives of women around the world. She began as a union organizer for the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union (ILGWU), then moved up to become their Education and Public Relations Director for the Pacific Coast Region. In 1962, she was appointed Deputy Chief of the California Division of Fair Employment Practices, and in 1964 President Lyndon Johnson appointed her as the only woman on the newly established Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.


